This is an introductory course on acquisition, control, instrumentation and data processing as well as the application of specific instrumentation and tools in different fields of physics. a wide range of teaching and learning tasks are implemented such as lectures, practice sessions and laboratory sessions.

ELECTRONICS:

1. Signal conditioning

SIMULATION OF PHYSICAL SYSTEMS

CONDENSED MATTER PHYSICS

1. Phase diagram gas- liquid.
 1. Objectives: Studying the hexafluoride sulphur gases (SF₆) and ethane (C₂H₆), and their gas - liquid phase diagram.
2. Thermal and electrical conductivity of metals.
 1. Objectives: Determining the thermal and electrical conductivity of various metals. Experimental verification of the Wiedemann - Franz law

FARADAY EFFECT

- Objectives: Measuring the magnetic field in the air gap of a magnetic circuit. Observation of Faraday effect in a glass

ULTRASONIC TESTING

- Objectives: Determining the speed of propagation of elastic waves in solids. Determination of thickness of pieces accessible on one side only. Detection of internal cracks

RADIATION PHYSICS.

1. Study of the natural radiation with a NaI (Tl) detector
2. Detector commissioning and calibration
3. Data taking
4. Data analysis and conclusions

ACOUSTICS:

1. Estimation of effective A-weighted sound pressure levels when hearing protectors are worn. (ISO/DIS 4869-2).

2. Determination of sound power levels and sound energy levels of noise sources using sound pressure - Engineering methods for an essentially free field over a reflecting plane. (ISO 3744).
3. Determination of sound absorption coefficient and impedance in impedance tubes -- Part 1: Method using standing wave ratio. (ISO 10534-1).
