4.1.Methodological overview

The learning process that has been designed for this subject is based on the following:

The TFG will consist of the completion of an own and original work of one of the 3 modalities mentioned above (research report, design of a project or systematization of an experience) where the knowledge, skills, aptitudes and attitudes acquired by the student throughout the degree are shown.

Students must demonstrate that at the end of their studies they are capable of demonstrating broad knowledge of the different subjects studied in the Degree and of presenting and defending them.

The works will contain sufficient elements of personal creation and will adequately cite all the sources used.

The work can be done individually or in groups. The groups to carry out works will have a maximum of three components.

The defence of the group work must be individual.

4.2.Learning tasks

The program offered to the student to help him/her achieve the expected results includes the following activities...

The Undergrate Dissertation will have a director who will tutor and supervise the student's work. The director, therefore, may belong to any of the knowledge areas represented in the Social Work Degree.

The subject of the project will be established by mutual agreement between the student and the director. To this end, each professor will establish at the beginning of the academic year the thematic lines that he/she will direct.

4.3.Syllabus

The subject, does not have a program to use as such. Each director will agree with the student the supervision and tutoring sessions, and will give the pertinent orientations for the realization of the work.

4.4.Course planning and calendar

The tutoring of the Undergraduate Dissertation (TFG, Trabajo Fin de Grado) requires sessions that each Director must establish with his or her student. These sessions lead to the acquisition of the skills established in the subject: through the exercise of observation, criticism and reflection, students will be instructed in the application in a related, structured and synthetic way of the concepts learned throughout the studies leading to the Degree in Social Work. It should be remembered that the TFG is 10 ECTS credits that for 25 student hours each credit represents 250 student work to be developed during the second semester of the fourth course of the Degree. Although we will try, as far as possible, to bring forward the dates of choice of subject and director, so that the completion of the TFG can be anticipated.

The TFG may be deposited in the following periods: February, June, September and November on the dates established by the Commission for the Guarantee of the Degree; in any case, after the end of the period for delivery of the minutes of each call for exams. The specific dates of the deposit will be made public at the beginning of each academic year.

The defence of the TFG will be carried out, in general, at least 15 days after their deposit, on the dates established in this respect by the Commissions for the Guarantee of Qualifications, although this period may be modified if circumstances so advise. All of the above will be publicised and sufficient information will be provided. The dates will be made public at the beginning of each school year, and any proposal for modification will be publicised.
