 - The rise of Polite usage. Purists and linguistic correction. 'Talking Proper'.
 - Robert Lowth's Grammar. Dictionaries and spelling books.
- Topic 4.
 - Standard accents and others.
 - Images of accents. Symbols of the social divide. Educating accents.
- Topic 5.
 - Standard and non-standard grammatical variation. Genteel vs. vulgar language.
 - Lexical variation. Lexical varieties in Modern and Contemporary English.
- Topic 6.
 - Geographical variation in the United Kingdom.
 - The regional dialects of England: major divisions. English in Scotland and Northern Ireland.
