1. General information

1.1. Aims of the course

The subject and its expected results respond to the following approaches and objectives:

The general objective of this subject is that the student, from the knowledge of the different training activities that comprise it, has acquired the theoretical skills and practical skills necessary to assimilate the legal and deontological regulations, as well as the tools of communication assistance to the exercise And practice of medicine.

In Legislation I the student must:

- Introduce yourself in the law by acquiring the basic concepts that make you understand the subject, as well as knowing the structure of health law and fundamental regulations from the perspective of different areas of law.
- To know the requirements of the legal profession of the medical profession and the consequences of its non-compliance.
- The legal nature of the medical-sanitary act, its functions and competences, as well as the different ways of practicing the medical profession.
- The rights of patients and their professional duties
- The legal consequences of non-compliance with medical duties with respect to the patient: professional legal and deontological medical professional responsibility.

In Medical Ethics and Care Communication, a progressive agenda is developed that will be developed according to the following teaching scheme for training in:

- A) Attitudes: promotion of a provision of intellectual openness and activation of professional qualities based on respect for the patient and responsibility in sustaining the health system.
- B) Knowledge: concepts and foundation in clinical ethics, care communication and clinical interview.
- C) Skills:
 - Training for a clinical relationship of excellence
 - Training for deliberation and ethical argumentation

These approaches and objectives are aligned with the following Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the United Nations 2030 Agenda (<https://www.un.org/sustainabledevelopment/es/>), in such a way that the acquisition of the results of Subject learning provides training and competence to contribute to some extent to its achievement.

1.2. Context and importance of this course in the degree

In accordance with:

Order ECI / 332/2008, of February 13, which establishes the requirements for the verification of official university degrees

that qualify for the practice of the profession of Physician, and

The Resolution of October 20, 2009, of the University of Zaragoza, which published the curriculum of Graduate in Medicine that includes within the subjects / compulsory subjects of 3rd year (second semester) of the Degree.

The general objective of this course is that students, based on the knowledge of the different training activities that comprise it, have acquired the theoretical skills and practical skills necessary to assimilate the legal and deontological regulations, as well as the tools of communication assistance to the exercise and Practice of medicine.

The subject of "Medical Communication, Medical Ethics and Legislation I", is independent and different from the rest of subjects that includes the Medical Degree, although at the same time it is related to all of them. The exercise of any of the activities that the doctor / specialist (care, teaching, research, management, prevention, ...) needs to know, apply and have a proper attitude to their ethical and legal duties, as well as Essential content and skills of clinical communication and clinical interview

1.3. Recommendations to take this course

The subject is composed of two subjects "Medical Communication, Medical Ethics I" and "Legislation I" which are complemented by the subject "Assistance Communication, Medical Ethics and Legislation II", characterized by having contents and language that differs nuclearly from the rest Of the subjects of the Degree of Medicine, of great importance because they are transversal to the rest of curricular subjects and contents of the degree. Every doctor or medical specialist should apply them in the future, regardless of the modality of their professional practice.

For these reasons, the student is recommended: the attendance to class and the accomplishment of the practical activities of each subject that composes the subject; The personal study supported in the bibliography, the active participation of the student that is fundamental and, all this, with the support and the orientation of the teaching staff.

The purpose of these recommendations is to reach the learning outcomes that define the subject and its competences, as well as equip students with the tools and elements for reflection that will be useful to them throughout their professional life.

2.2. Learning goals

By surpassing this subject, the student will demonstrate that he is able to explain, apply and act in accordance with the theoretical-practical basic concepts of Health Legislation and Medical Ethics that affect any modality of the practice of Medicine.

And, to recognize all the elements that construct a clinical interview, to structure them, and to apply strategies for an excellent communication with the patient.

It is competent to apply the knowledge of legal norms and ethical and deontological standards in the professional practice, mainly in the area of ??patients 'rights (doctors' duties)

The student will also be able to develop and practice the communication skills learned.

He will know the consequences of breaching his ethical and legal duties and the bases of legal and deontological responsibility in his professional practice.

Will be able to recognize professional attitudes of good and bad medical praxis in relation to healthcare communication, reflect on them and assimilate for themselves everything necessary for a good communication of care.

4. Methodology, learning tasks, syllabus and resources

4.1. Methodological overview

The learning process that has been designed for this subject is based on the following:

With the combination of theoretical classes in a large group, theoretical-practical tutorials in small or individualized groups, practical work, seminars/discussion in small groups, and the special importance of the personal study. As well as the interaction in the forums, debates through Moodle and in-person in the different seminars and activities. The realization of the student's reflective work, which is reflected in the final portfolio, is essential for this.

4.2. Learning tasks

The course includes the following learning tasks:

LEGISLATION I (3 ECTS)

- A) Theoretical teaching (19h = 0,76 ECTS): Explanation and orientation to the personal study of the different contents of the subject, aimed at the acquisition of competences and learning outcomes. All the necessary resources will be used for interaction with students and support in the various audio-visual supports, including video conferencing if possible. In addition to encouraging the active participation of the student in the theoretical classes, tutorials will be done in a personalized way, with the request of the teacher or through Moodle.
- B) Practical teaching: type 2 (6h = 0,24 ECTS) and type 6 (20h = 0,8 ECTS). Practical teaching tutored in small subgroups, according to Plan of Bologna and completion of work. It aims to stimulate, guide and follow the students in the elaboration of a tutorial work following the methodology of learning based on problem-solving, from the perspective of the medical-legal problem of the different contents of the subject.

Legislation I: 3 ECTS (75 h).

- COMMUNICATION ASSISTANCE, MEDICAL ETHICS I (3 ECTS)
This subject is compulsory and semester. Its elective load is 6 ECTS, of which:
0.5 theoretical ECTS, (master class I),
0.2 practical ECTS (problem solving and cases, Type I),
0.5 ECTS tutored practices, type 6, and

1,8 ECTS of personal work destined to carry out the work on practical cases, and study to acquire the competences of the subject.

4.3. Syllabus

The course will address the following topics:

Class topics with large groups (Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9 to 10 h) *

- Concepts and History of Bioethics. Ethics and Medical Ethics. Ethics logic against the logic of law. The challenge of defensive medicine. The principles of autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence and justice.
- ethical references in the practice of the different types of medicine: curative, palliative, preventive and satisfactive.
- Models of clinical ethics and doctor-patient relationship: patronizing, contractualist, cooperative. The therapeutic distance.
- Types of ethical issues in professional practice: attitudes, dilemmas and operational on a day to day issues of the medical profession. Procedures in decision-making. Care Ethics Committees.
- Confidentiality in clinical practice: ethical, limits and exceptions. The concept confident required. Practical issues in the development of clinical history and clinical documentation management.
- Ethics prescription. Scientific evidence, patient information and efficiency. deontological rules. Ethical issues in the relationship with the pharmaceutical industry medical providers and health care institutions.
- Ethics relations between professionals. Work in multidisciplinary teams. Respect for colleagues. Loyalty to the patient, colleague and to the institution. Professional ethics of dealing with the sick colleague (PAIME) or professional difficulties. The responsibility for continuing education and professional development.
- Ethics of Biomedical Research. The responsibility to investigate and communicate knowledge. Scientific authorship. national and international standards governing research. Ethics committees of clinical research.
- Ethics and palliative care in the patient in a terminal situation. Diagnostic and therapeutic obstinacy. The adequacy of the therapeutic effort. The right of refusal and choice of treatments. Palliative sedation. The euthanasia debate.
- Introduction to communication and the clinical interview. The doctor-patient relationship. The objectives and phases of the clinical interview. The patient-centered communication. The style of consultation and participation of the patient. Reference models and models of doctor-patient relationship.
- Non-verbal communication. Noise, interference. The image formation side in the clinical interview. Listening skills. Proxemics. Kinésica. Paralanguage.
- The clinical interview. exploratory phase of communication with the patient. First interview skills. Interview techniques. Types of interview. Common errors in the exploratory phase.
- The clinical interview. Information phase. Information technology. Common mistakes. Difficulties in identifying situations. Clinical decision: main models of problem solving.
- The clinical interview. negotiating phase. Persuasion, negotiation techniques and assignment. The clinical decision in the patient's bedside. Patient empowerment in their own health and shared decision making.
- How to give bad news. The doctor and patient to bad news. Basics and guidance elements. Objectives of communication at the end of life. Stages of acceptance and adaptation to the bad news. Difficulties in communication with the patient in palliative care.
- Mourning and its process. most common reactions to grief. performance before the match. Pathological mourning. The grieving process in children.

Seminars (small groups)

- Seminar 1. Exploration of different types of patients. Trials in different models interview. Role playing.
- Seminar 2. How to give bad news. The Latin model and the Anglo-Saxon model. Addressing the conspiracy of silence.
- Seminar 3. Informed consent as a way of clinical setting. The concept of adequate information. The patient's ability in decision-making and assessment. Voluntariness and ethics of external influences: persuasion, manipulation, coercion.
- Seminar 4. Ethical Recommendations for the medical student during their clinical practice (Guide prepared by the Student)
