5. The Alliance of Pompey, Graso and Caesar (62-52 BC)

6. The Civil War and the Dictatorship of Caesar (51-44 BC)
7. Augustus (44 BC-14 AD) and the Establishment of the Principality.
8. The Roman Empire under the Julius-Claudians (14-68). The Principality Gentilis.
9. The Time of the Flavios (69-96). The Rise of the Noutas.
10. The Dynasty of the Antonines until Marco Aurelio (96-161). The Principality Ciuilis.
11. The Prolegomena of the Crisis of the 3th Century: from Marco Aurelio to Severo Alejandro (161-235).
12. The Crisis of the Third Century (235-284).
13. The Transformation of the Late Roman State (284-476).
