1. General information

The objective is the knowledge of the general theories of Culture and, especially, of the new research trends in Prehistory and Archeology in order to be able to interpret material culture and elaborate the corresponding historical discourse.

2. Learning results

Acquire critical knowledge at an advanced level of the main historiographic trends of study in Prehistory and Archeology (CE4).
Is able to know at an advanced level the social, economic and religious implications of archaeological remains in the light of new research, methodological and interpretation trends in Prehistory and Archeology (CE9).

Is capable of applying the latest tendencies of ideological analysis to the study of archaeological remains for their understanding and interpretation, in such a way that they make it possible to carry out an initiation to research work (CE12).

Is able to carry out analysis and make synthesis about the current debates on theory and discourse in Prehistory and Archeology with the quality appropriate to their advanced levels of knowledge (CT2).

It integrates methodological knowledge and faces the complexity of formulating interpretive judgments based on information that includes reflections on social and ethical responsibilities in Prehistory and Archeology (CB3).

5. Assessment system

FIRST CALL

a) Continuous Assessment System (if applicable):

1.-The student must carry out throughout the course the practical exercises assigned by the professor, consisting of the study, analysis and critical commentary of cases. 40% of the final grade.

2.- The student will have to elaborate a personal work on some of the subjects of the program of the subject. The work will be personal and original. Its extension will oscillate between 10 and 15 pages (letter 12, times and single space). Your presentation

will take place in class. 40% of the final grade.

3.- Active participation in class. 20% of the final grade. The assiduous active and adequate participation of the student in the debates that arise will be valued.

b) Global Assessment Test:

The test will consist of:

1. Written exam that will address the entire course material and will account for 60% of the grade.

2. Practical exercise that will be related to the activities carried out throughout the semester and will account for 40% of the grade.

SECOND CALL

Global Assessment Test: the same as that of the first call.
