### 1. General information

In this subject, the different forms of protest and their objectives are historiographically linked with the processes of transition to democracy initiated in Mediterranean Europe, particularly in Spain.

The Spanish case is dealt with in a more detailed manner. We analyse the social movements that acted as engine of democratic change and eroded and cracked the supports of the Franco regime, while pressuring the reformist or "evolutionist" sectors on the need to democratize.

It analyses the labour world as well as the industrial, agrarian, university and neighbourhood protests. It also examines the influence these social movements had on the negotiation of political elites in the period under consideration.

# 3. Syllabus

- Social movements and democratizing waves. Historiography on the transitions to democracy. The pulse of the street. Trade unionism and workers' unrest. The university hotbed.
- "Socialism in a single street": mobilized neighbourhoods. Agrarian protest. From the undersigned to the assemblies:

- professionals and intellectuals.
- The grey blows of repression, 1968-1977. The Public Order Court (TOP) and the military courts. The *partidas de la porra* (truncheon parties): far right and police connivance.
- The international dimension of the transition process in Spain: the role of the United States, France, the United Kingdom and the Federal Republic of Germany.

## 4. Academic activities

### Teaching methodology:

- Master class: theoretical-practical exposition of the fundamental concepts.
- Seminar: study, discussion and solving of problems and case studies related to the theoretical and practical concepts based on the readings done by the students.

### Training activities:

- Expository classes
- · Source and resource management
- Text analysis
- · Personal work of the student on readings, texts, sources and resources for the preparation of other activities.
- · Discussions.

Written development of a topic: individual work by students to prepare an essay.

## 5. Assessment system

First call: continuous assessment:

- Class attendance and participation in classroom activities 20%.
- Critical debate in the classroom: evaluation of the students' interventions on the problems raised in the class 20%.
- Individual written work: evaluation of an essay on the content of the subject

Assessment criteria: in general, the ability to present orally and/or write on a topic, the ability to relate and critique events, processes and historiographic debates, as well as the reasoned argumentation of ideas.

First call: global assessment: exam on the contents and texts worked on in the course.

Assessment criteria: the ability to relate and critique events, processes and historiographical debates, as well as the clarity of exposition, reasoned argumentation of ideas, clear and precise writing and spelling.

Second call: global assessment: identical to the first call.
