#### 1. General information

Specifically, "Ancient Hispania" aims to concretize the development of some of the historical processes dealt with in other subjects, as well as to address other specific ones in the precise geographical framework of the Iberian Peninsula, so that it may serve to complete the diachronic vision of this historical space together with the subjects devoted to the history of medieval, modern and contemporary Spain.

It is assumed that the student is familiar with the geography of the peninsula. A knowledge of other modern languages will be very useful, since there is a remarkable bibliography on ancient Hispania, especially in French, German and English. A basic knowledge of classical languages will be of great help, although the sources will be used in their Spanish translation.

# 5. Assessment system

#### First call.

Test 1. Written test (50% of the final grade) with two parts: the writing of a topic explained in class, to choose between two proposed by the teacher; and the commentary of a historical source or the clarification of a concept.

Test 2. Preparation of historical maps, comments on historical sources or preparation of external practices(20% of the final grade).

Test 3. Writing an essay (30% of the final grade).
